STCAA has officially petitioned the Supreme Court of the State of New York for permission to assume ownership of 8 Montcalm Street. The petition has been submitted to the court and we are awaiting a decision as the court winds its way through the slow summer months. Legal counsel is optimistic that the petition will be granted and in time to enjoy the fall holidays in true Sig Tau spirit.

Ownership requires many levels of responsibility. The STCAA is well prepared to fulfill its responsibilities and we need your continued support. We are asking you, our general membership, to focus on financial and recruitment support. Please make every effort to pay your annual dues and participate in our events and fundraising projects. We are continuously attempting to find our lost brothers and to get our current membership more familiar with the operations of the STCAA. Please help us identify brothers from your generation who are not members of the STCAA. As we grow, we also require more members to take leadership positions. If you are interested in taking a more active role in the STCAA, please contact any of the officers listed on this newsletter and we'll gladly get you more involved.

The cross-generational brotherhood is stronger than ever. We are extremely excited that the active community has attended cross-generational workshops designed to resurrect traditions and successful operating tips from the "older" brothers. ### TREASURER'S REPORT: "By The Numbers"

Since our last newsletter much has happened. We have taken in another \$6800 since January 1st, all from another 55 alumni. The June 18th, 2nd Annual Alumni Golf Tournament netted another \$2000. Here is how that money was spent.

In addition to the two new windows the STCAA paid for, thirty additional windows were donated by Alumni. A nameplate will be placed below each window for the brother that donated the window. If you are interested in donating a window the cost is \$240.00. We have 40 more to replace so every donation counts. Let us know what room you would like it in and if you would like to see which windows are left e-mail me at Frank@lrmp.com and I will send you an attachment. If we haven't already done so we will have a place on the website for the window program soon.

So as you can see, every penny that is donated goes to renovating and preserving the ETX House at 8 Montclam Street. All rents are now paid to the STCAA, which acts as landlord. By establishing this procedure we now are in control of all bills and rents so that taxes, utilities and the current mortgage with deceased Dr. Perez's widow Marie, are paid on time.

I can't thank everyone enough for all their support this year. Every dollar you donate counts. We have close to 600 alumni on our database. Of that, we have close to 250 that have given over the last three years. Please keep it coming!

One of the things that has made this entire program work is the alumni database we have along with all the email addresses. If you move please send me your new address along with your new email address if you have one. In addition please send me a copy of your composite if you still can find it. Check out the website and if you don't see someone you hung with and you have their information please email it to me. I estimate that we have only reached 40% of all the alumni.

## **RESTORATION CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**

As restoration chairman of the Sigma Tau Chi Alumni Association I would like to thank each and every brother who has donated their time and money to the cause of renovating and making our house a better place for all of our current Sigma Tau Chi Brothers. For some of us it's been many years since we were last at 8 Montclam and for others it may be a not-so-distant memory. Either way, we all cherish the memories of our times there. Although the house alone isn't the fraternity, it is the focal point of many of our activities as a collective association and the focal point of our reunions and gatherings. With this in mind we have been, for the last three years, working on improving various areas of the house.

We sincerely hope this will help our active members attract and retain progressively larger

groups of pledges and eventually brothers. Due to funding and time restraints, we have concentrated on the worst areas first, but with a workable game plan in place to concentrate on areas to make the house as energy efficient as possible.

Our window donation campaign has been going well, and to-date 31 windows have been donated to the house. Given that we have approximately 75 windows in the house, many more still need attention. Once completed we will work on areas such as the dance floor, where many windows have been covered. Someday we can uncover and replace these with energy efficient windows to regain the beautiful view of the lake and to allow the summer breezes to cool the house in the way it was designed. While on the topic of how the house was originally built, we recently received some wonderful copies of an 1851 article from a book called "The Architect" which was a publication put out by William Rantlett, the architect of our house. We were given a set of plans that alumni Jeff Mangus found several years ago, but recently we were able to obtain direct copies from The Friends of the Hermitage in Ho-Ho-Kus, NJ, who own an original book. The clarity of the copies will allow us to publish the house plans on our website—a great thing for any brothers who are history buffs. You will see that the owner, Myron Pardee, had the house built with changes made from the original plans. All in all they are very interesting and quite close to what was actually built.

We will be revamping our website shortly and adding much of the historical information that was collected. We are looking for any computer-savvy brothers who could help in this endeavor. Our current webmaster, Rudy Drogo, has recently graduated and is gainfully employed. We would appreciate any help that others could offer.

We are also currently looking for a replacement for my position of Restoration Chairman, as I am returning full-time to college to pursue a goal of fulfilling my teacher certification for Technology Education in NYS. As a volunteer organization we need as much as possible from every alumni. From joining the alumni association, we can't continue our current progress without more support. If you were to talk with any person who has volunteered to work on the house or who has been up to an alumni weekend or any other alumni event, you will find everyone gets out more than what they put in. No different than our days at Oswego as members of the active community. Please, consider giving of your time and helping as needed. If you can't

help with hands-on projects or by joining the alumni association, we can't continue our current progress without more support. There are still many ways you can contribute, sending dues annually, spreading the word to other alumni to join, and funding a window for our "Donate-a-Window" program. I would ask that everyone get involved and for those that are involved, locate two brothers who aren't involved yet and get them on-board. We need everyone.

I'm sure we easily have several hundred alumni out there, perhaps over a thousand. If we could get 500 on-board and committed to donating \$100 annual alumni dues each year we could be putting \$50,000.00 into the house each year. I am confident that this would allow us to continue with much-needed improvements to our house in the coming years.

Many brothers may be just out of college or between jobs or have families and mortgages of their own, I know I do. Just think of \$100 a year to be less than \$2.00 a week. Broken down that way it sure doesn't seem too bad, does it? Please contact me or any of the other board members to ask questions, make comments, or to volunteer. Thanks!

*On Saturday, July 20, several brothers showed up to help in the second annual clean up of the grounds and some interior repairs. 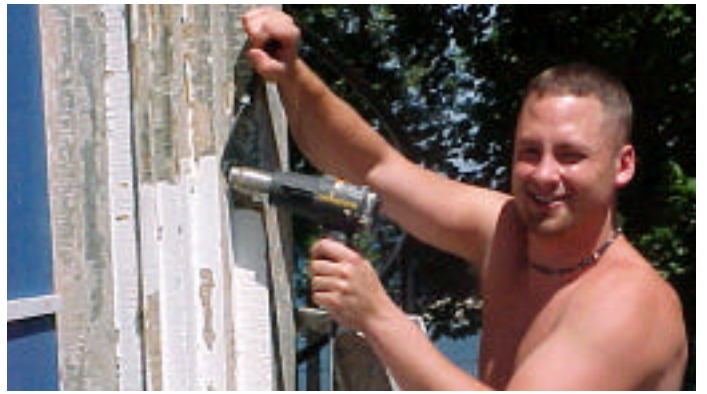
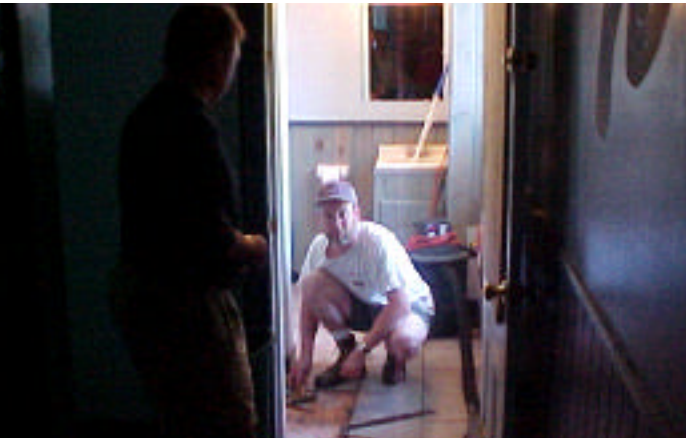
